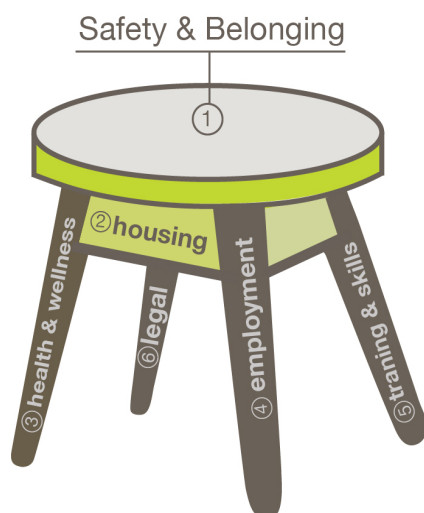

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

for New Initiatives

- 1 **Verify that any proposed initiative will effectively address a systems gap**
Avoid duplication and review the evidence-base for a proposed program or service
- 2 **Corroborate stakeholder support for the initiative**
Broker relationships and trust among Streetohome Partners (City of Vancouver, Vancouver Coastal Health, BC Housing, and Vancouver Police) and between Streetohome and service providers (e.g., inclusive study trips)
- 3 **Identify how the initiative will be integrated into existing systems**
Be wary of parallel systems, accompanying inefficiencies, and confusing system navigation
- 4 **Ensure a trusted service provider partner is committed to leading the initiative**
Confirm validation of the model with prospective clientele and service provider's Board support
- 5 **Demonstrate confidence in fundraising by focus-testing appeal with donors**
Substantiate service provider's ability to sustain funding
- 6 **Guarantee that data is accessible, collected, evaluated, and shared**
Streetohome has predefined reporting requirements in funding agreements

Housing is only one of several dimensions of any thriving citizen. Individuals with lived experience of, or at-risk for, homelessness may have multiple unmet needs.



Streetohome Stool

- 1 **Personal, gender, and cultural safety; sense of belonging; inclusiveness; and community integration.**
- 2 **Housing needs** (e.g., family reunification, independent housing, shelter, supportive housing, addiction treatment/recovery housing).
- 3 **Care for problematic substance use, mental health challenges, and physical well-being** including vision, auditory, and dental health.
- 4 **Labour market engagement and purposeful activity** by connecting employers with employees and organizations with volunteers.
- 5 **Life skills development;** high-school equivalency; continuing education; knowledge & skills certification; work readiness skills; and/or job training.
- 6 **Resolution of legal issues** including immigration status, justice system involvement, securing government benefits, family law, housing and employment rights.

Gone fishing

We've learned many lessons since our start in 2008, and have built a repertoire of more than a few John-isms over the years.

One of our favourites – “we can't build ourselves out of homelessness,” – signified a strategic shift towards prevention to fill gaps in the system, rather than focusing exclusively on building supportive housing. Under John's leadership, Streetohome has contributed to 35 projects – 23 supportive housing buildings and 12 prevention projects since 2008. Now, after 15 years at the helm, John McLernon is stepping down as Board Chair.

“Streetohome's role is to improve homelessness and mitigate its impact – we've learned that there's no single, silver bullet solution to ending it,” says John. “Our success lies in being able to gather key people to look at what we're doing, collaborate and enhance each other's projects, find gaps in the homelessness services system, and broker innovative projects that can fill those gaps.”

Not only did Streetohome discover that a one-size-fits-all solution simply won't produce better outcomes for many, but there was a cost efficiency to focusing on prevention, explains John. These smaller prevention and recovery projects such as the Vancouver Rent Bank; Supporting Tenants, Enabling Pathways (STEP); Homeward Bound; Recovery Café; or Want2, may help a more niche or smaller cohort of people at the start, especially when compared to housing hundreds at a time in a high-rise. However, their sustainability adds up exponentially, at less cost per person compared to building a supportive housing unit.

“It just came to me one day. Construction is expensive and we’ve seen housing projects that didn’t go according to plan due to a lack of understanding around tenants’ needs. We needed more knowledge around what their individual needs were, and alternative ways to help them that would complement their housing so they could move forward in their lives,” explains John.

“Connection is the most important thing in life – to be connected with friends, teammates, neighbours – you can’t function effectively without it. If you don’t have a community, your physical and mental wellness goes downhill fast. The more we can help people become a part of the community, the better outcomes we’ll see for those experiencing homelessness,” explains John.

“We’ve learned some really good lessons since our start. One of the key takeaways for me is that there’s so many people doing wonderful work in this sector, as well as around the world. You don’t need to reinvent the wheel. We’ve been able to take a lot of good ideas and adapt them for Vancouver in a way where they’ve had a major impact on street homelessness.”

As Streetohome moves forward, there will be a renewed focus on the Streetohome Stool’s domains to enhance and complement promising support services, and bring innovative housing models to Vancouver – especially those projects that bring a sense of belonging to individuals, along with promoting mutual concern and accountability for one another, says Kevin.

“We need to understand community and how to foster and improve it to better people’s lives. The Recovery Café is a great example of this,” he says.

John’s departure coincides with the renewal of our strategic framework, led by founding directors Geoff Cowper and Kevin Bent. Kevin has also stepped up to take the helm as incoming Board Chair in 2023.

“When I first sat down with John to hear about his vision for Streetohome, and some of the potential Board members he was approaching, I couldn’t help but think that this was a very, very cool initiative,” says Kevin.

As we continue our journey under Kevin’s leadership, John says he is confident we’ll accomplish what we set out to do in our renewed strategic framework, and continue to make a positive impact on homelessness in Vancouver.

With his never-ending passion for addressing homelessness, John will continue to be involved in special projects and committees. This isn’t goodbye, but merely an, ‘I’ll see you later.’

Renewing our commitment to changing lives and building better futures

2022 proved to be the end of an era for Streetohome. Our founding Board Chair, John McLernon, initiated a strategic renewal process to revitalize our commitment to addressing homelessness and its impact on Vancouver, as he announced his departure as Chair in 2023.

It's been 15 years since Streetohome was initiated by John at the Vancouver Foundation, inspired by his work with homeless youth. He brought together a strong Board of people with varying perspectives who worked cohesively as a team to impact change. Two of these individuals, founding directors Geoff Cowper and Kevin Bent, are leading the strategic planning process.

“When we started in 2008, we hoped that by advancing Housing First we'd enable existing services to fully engage with homeless people and to address the circumstances of their lives that needed help – whether it was mental health supports or recovery or something else,” says Geoff Cowper, and Co-chair of the Strategic Plan Steering Committee, alongside Kevin Bent.

“We've since tweaked our strategy and tactics to really look at where there were gaps in the system to put programs in place that had a significant impact in those areas,” explains Kevin.

As we move forward, our efforts will focus on complementing existing services and contributing to a holistic approach to meet the diverse needs of individuals, including: employment; learning, training & skills; housing; health & wellness;

legal & advocacy; and community & belonging. Promising support services will be brokered and leveraged to complement the current system, alongside innovative housing models that include a comprehensive array of supports to reflect those needs.

“The community and belonging piece is really important now, especially in addressing mental health and substance use challenges. You need to feel valued, get up in the morning with a purpose, share what you're doing and be able to rely on friends and family for feedback and support based on what you think is important in your life. It's vitally imperative to being a well-rounded, thriving individual,” says Kevin. “Delancey Street is a great example of this. It incorporates training, employment, and housing together while creating a culture of belonging and mutual accountability for participants.”

Individuals are more likely to have improved outcomes when they're able to find services and

supports that meet their individual needs and desires, rather than a one-size-fits-all solution.

“We've learned that engagement with services, and a variety of options to choose from, is critical to the success of clients,” says Geoff.

“Housing without that engagement with services is inadequate and incomplete. When you read the strategic framework, the main takeaway is that we

need to focus our response to ensure that we maximize the accessibility of services to clients when we engage in new projects, as well as existing housing and programs.”

“I hope we can become a leader in connecting services with clients both in existing and new projects; be a champion in ensuring that people make the progress they want in their lives; and figure out how to best equip them and walk with them to make that progress,” says Geoff.

Streetohome’s renewed strategic framework will be released by the end of 2023.

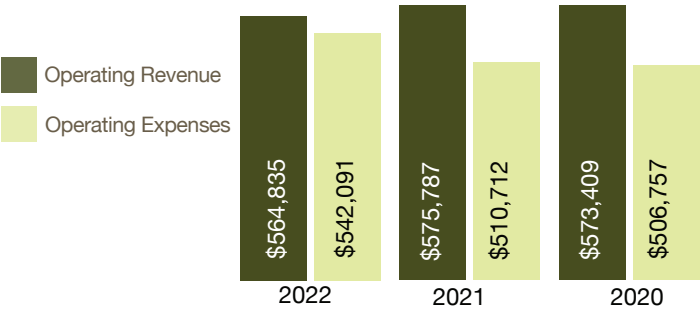

Streetohome Financials

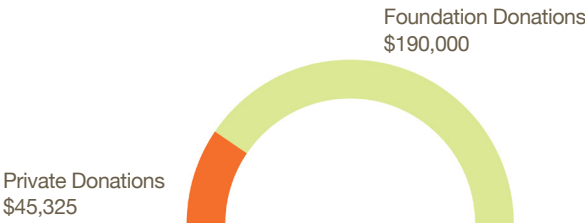
Operating Revenues/Expenses

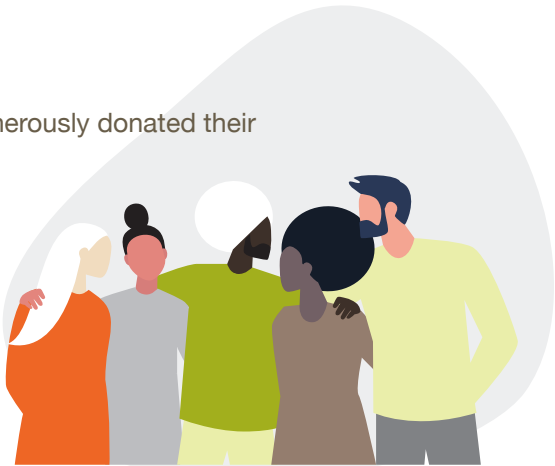
